Course Objectives/Competencies:

1. Upon completion, students should be able to explain theories, practices, and issues related to law enforcement operations.
2. Upon completion, students should be able identify the basic principles of patrol operations to include objectives and activities of the patrol division
3. Upon completion, students will have an understanding of specialized police operations to include criminal investigations, juvenile issues and gang operations.

4. Upon completion, students will be aware of ethical and liability issues in law enforcement.
