Course Description

This course provides an examination of the various psychological disorders, as well as theoretical, clinical, and experimental perspectives of the study of psychopathology. Emphasis is placed on terminology, classification, etiology, assessment, and treatment of the major disorders. Upon completion, students should be able to distinguish between normal and abnormal behavior patterns as well as demonstrate knowledge of etiology, symptoms, and therapeutic techniques. *This course has been approved to satisfy the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement general education core requirement in social/behavioral sciences.*

Course Objectives/Competencies:

Upon completion of this course the student should be able to:

1. Recognize the problems associated with defining, predicting, and treating abnormal behavior
2. Understand the system of classification that is currently used in the diagnosis of mental disorders
3. Identify the different theoretical views regarding abnormal behavior and the causes of abnormal behavior
4. Identify the various types of behavior disorders and describe the symptoms associated with individual psychological disorders.

To be successful in this course you will need to:

- Be an active participant in class and small group discussions regarding topics in psychology (1 and 2).
- Apply critical thinking skills to material presented in the textbook, lectures, activities, and discussions (1, 2, and 3)
- Work independently and as part of a group to successfully complete written assignments related to material from the course (1, 2 and 6)
- Develop an understanding of cultural, racial, and ethnic differences in human thought and behavior (6).

Attendance Policy/Tardiness/Make-Up Work:

Attendance and participation are important in order for you to be successful in this course. You will be responsible for material that is covered during class lectures that is not covered in the textbook.

Make-Up Work/Later Assignments:

There will be no make-up for missed tests or quizzes. Before calculation of your final grade, your lowest test grade will be dropped. Therefore, a missed test will be the grade that is dropped. For quizzes, the lowest grade will be dropped. Therefore, a missed quiz will be the grade that is dropped. This means that an assignment submitted a week late will be assessed a 70 point penalty. Projects **will not** be accepted late.

Tests: There will be five tests on the dates and topics listed in the attached course outline. Tests will cover material from the textbook and from class lectures.

Projects: There will be a final project that will require research and a class presentation. There will also be at least 2 small group projects. All project information will be provided via LEO at a later date.

Written Assignments: During the semester we will have several writing assignments consisting of group assignments, internet assignments, and other activities.
