Course Objectives/Competencies:

1. What are the best practices in securing a Windows PC?
2. What are the best practices in securing a typical home PC?
3. How can you secure remote access over the Internet?
4. What type of attacks use email?
5. Understand basic web vulnerabilities.
6. Be able to setup basic antivirus software.
8. Be able to implement wireless security in a wireless access point or router.
9. Be able to set up Windows security based on SP2.
10. Understand the concepts of a DMZ.
11. Be able to find information on malware on the Internet.
12. What are viruses, spyware, Trojans, and worms?
13. What are typical policies in business/institutions that relate to security.

Grading Criteria/Tests/Projects:

There will be three quizzes, exercises, and a final exam. Quizzes will be scheduled at least a week in advance. If you miss a scheduled quiz, be ready to take the make-up upon your first return to class unless you have made other arrangements. Without prior arrangements, make-up quizzes are short answer instead of multiple choice. If you know you cannot take a quiz at the scheduled time, let your instructor know in advance. The final will be comprehensive. You will have both hands-on exercises you can complete in the computer lab and other exercises to be completed and turned in. Exercises will have a due date and will be scored. You will not receive the maximum score if your work is turned in after the due date. Exercises more than 3 meetings overdue will not be accepted and graded as zero.

At the end of the semester, the three quiz scores, the final and the exercise grade will be averaged. Each counts equally toward your grade. The grading scale below will determine your final grade. If your final average at the end of the quarter is between grades, such as 84.3, then your attendance will determine whether you get the higher grade. If you have three absences or less, you get the higher grade. If you have over three absences for any reason, your grade remains the same.
