

What is a College Transfer Program?

The transfer program at Mayland Community College is a group of selected courses that prepare you to enter a college or university as a junior (depending on how many courses you take at MCC). The courses in these programs parallel those taken by freshmen and sophomores at the four-year colleges. At MCC we have different transfer programs to meet your needs. Each program consists of selected courses that you must complete in order to graduate. These courses include:

- General Education courses
- Courses in your intended major
- Appropriate electives

No matter which major you pursue, you will need to complete certain general education courses. These 44 semester hours of courses are known as the “core” classes, and include:

- English Composition
- Humanities/Fine Arts
- Social/Behavioral Science
- Natural Science/Math

What Are My Choices?

Mayland Community College has the following five transfer degree options:

- Associate of Arts degree
- Associate of Arts degree with a pre-major in Business Administration, Criminal Justice, or Social Work
- Associate in Science degree
- Associate in Arts Transfer Diploma or Associate in Science Transfer Diploma
- Completing the general core (44 hours) and then transferring to the four-year college, without finishing the degree or diploma
- Completing at least 30 semester hours of the general core and then transferring

North Carolina Comprehensive Articulation Agreement (CAA)

The CAA is a state wide agreement governing the transfer of credits between NC community colleges and NC public universities and has as its objective the smooth transfer of students. The CAA defines a 44 hour general education core which, if completed at the community college, is fully transferable to UNC institutions and will satisfy general education requirements. This means that a transfer student who completes the general education core at a NC community college will not be required to take other general education courses at a UNC institution, even if his/her 44 hour core does not completely match the university's. Students who earn an associate's degree according to the guidelines of the CAA will be treated as juniors at the receiving UNC institutions. Students graduating from NC community colleges under the guidelines of the CAA will have 64 hours of credit transferred to the UNC institution to which they are admitted. Because UNC institutions differ in their admission requirements students intending to transfer should contact the UNC institution(s) of their choice to learn about specific admissions requirements.



Frequently Asked Questions about College Transfer

1. What are the “MCR” requirements and are transfer students required to meet them?

“MCR” refers to the Minimum Course Requirements of the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina and apply to anyone who graduated from high school in 1990 or later. The minimum admissions requirements are:

- **English** Four course units emphasizing grammar, composition, and literature.
- **Mathematics** Three course units in one of the following combinations:
 - Algebra I, Algebra II, and Geometry
 - Algebra I, Algebra II, and one unit beyond Algebra II
 - Integrated Mathematics I, II, and III. (for 2005 graduates and earlier)Four course units in one of the following combinations:
 - Algebra I and II, Geometry, and one unit beyond Algebra II
 - Algebra I and II, and two units beyond Algebra II
 - Integrated Mathematics I, II, and III, and one unit beyond Integrated Mathematics III (for 2006 graduates and after)
- **Science** Three course units including at least one unit in a life or biological science, one unit in a physical science, and at least one laboratory course.
- **Social Studies** Two course units including one in United States History.
- **Second Language** A sequence of two course units of a language other than English. (For 2004 graduates and after)

If you are planning to transfer to one of the sixteen institutions in the University of North Carolina system you must have completed the MCR. **Students who do not meet the MCR during high school must complete the CAA 44 hour general education core OR complete six semester hours in each area listed below.** All courses must be transferable to the appropriate four-year college.

- English (6 semester hours)
- Math (6 semester hours)
- Natural Science (6 semester hours)
- Social Science (6 semester hours)
- Foreign Language (6 Semester hours) *For 2004 graduates and after*

2. What is the difference between the Associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees?

The Associate in Arts degree is designed for students planning to pursue a Bachelor’s degree in one of the liberal arts disciplines or at a school that requires a strong liberal arts background. The Associate in Science degree is designed for students planning to pursue a Bachelors degree in mathematics, the sciences or professional programs that require strong math and science backgrounds.

3. Can I transfer with an AAS degree?

It is possible to transfer with an AAS degree, but it will likely take longer to complete a Bachelors degree than with the AA or AS. The AAS degrees do not require as many general education courses as the AA, AS, or Bachelors degree, therefore students will be required to complete remaining general education requirements at MCC or at the four-year college. Also, most courses within the AAS degrees do not typically transfer to four-year schools. Another option for students planning to transfer with an AAS degree is to look for colleges offering “reverse transfer” programs. These programs, which are specially designed for individuals with the AAS degree, give credit for many of the course they have take in the AAS program as meeting requirements in the major.

5. **How many more years will I have to attend college after I leave Mayland, in order to get my Bachelor's degree?**

If you attend full time, and are admitted as a junior in your major, course work should be *approximately* two years at your four-year institution.

6. **Are transfer admissions requirements the same for all four-year schools in North Carolina?**

No! It is very important to check the catalog or website for each school regarding application deadline dates, minimum number of transfer hours, and GPA requirements for regular admission and/or admission to competitive majors. Typically, a 2.0 GPA is required for regular admission to a four-year school, but it is important to check the catalog. The GPA used for admission is calculated by the 4-year school and all grades in transferable courses, including repeated courses, are calculated in that GPA. It is also important to check on the admission requirements for individual major departments (i.e. Social Work, Education, or Business). These often differ from general admission requirements, so check the catalog or website.

7. **What factors should I consider when choosing a four-year college?**

- The number of associate degree hours that will transfer
- Tuition rates, out of state colleges and private colleges tend to be more expensive
- The number of students, smaller colleges provide more individualized attention
- The quality of the institution, including facilities, instructors, resources, libraries, technology, etc
- Your major, does the college offer it and is it a quality program
- The location, you may have a preference for where you want to live while in college
- Accreditation of the college and your major program
- Support services, compare the quality of academic support and disability services
- Cooperative education, many colleges have programs in which students can work for college credit in order to gain experience in their field
- Activities, think about your interests and whether or not the college has activities available in these area.

8. **When should I apply to the colleges I am considering?**

Each college has its own deadline for application; however a good rule of thumb is to apply a year ahead of the date you wish to enroll. You may find that some colleges will allow you to apply as late as one month prior to enrollment, however most colleges set their deadlines at approximately six months prior to enrollment. Waiting lists are another reason to apply early. It may be to your benefit to submit your application early in case you are placed on a waiting list.

9. **Will all my courses transfer?**

Never assume that they will. Generally speaking, all courses taken in the College Transfer curriculum will transfer to the four-year institution as an equivalent course or as an elective. The comprehensive articulation agreement assures the transfer of credit from the college transfer curriculum to institutions in the UNC system. It is still very important to follow the equivalency guides very carefully for private and out-of-state institutions and check with the specific department at the four-year institution concerning courses that are transferable into your

major. The four-year equivalency guides are available from the Counseling Center, the SOAR Program, faculty advisors, and MCC's webpage.

10. Is there a limit on the number of transfer students a four-year college will accept?

The 16 public UNC system schools place a cap on the number of transfer students accepted each year; however, most private four-year schools do not have a limit on the number of transfer students.

11. Will a grade of "D" transfer to the four-year school?

Generally speaking, no. If the school does accept a "D", the hours will not transfer. It is highly recommended that students repeat any courses in which they earn a grade of "D." A "D" in any CAA course will negate the CAA.

12. What is the maximum number of hours that can be transferred to the four-year school?

Most four-year schools accept a maximum of 60-68 semester hours. A minimum of 60 hours must be taken at the four-year school.

13. Are scholarships available for community college students who are transferring?

Yes. Some colleges have their own scholarships, which are described in their college handbook, and private industry offers scholarships to specific majors. Ask the Financial Aid Officer at Mayland and the colleges to which you are planning to transfer for information about scholarships for transfer students. You may also want to check out resources on the internet. There are several free on-line scholarship searches; there is no need to pay for this service.

14. Where can I get more information about the transfer process and about individual schools?

Visit Mayland's Counseling Center. A counselor will be available to help you track down the information you need to make informed decisions regarding your educational and career plans. Students who are in the SOAR Program can see the Transfer Counselor for in-depth assistance as well. You may also wish to consult your faculty advisor. Finally, remember that College Days are set up in both the fall and spring, where you can meet with college admissions representatives and collect materials.

15. Does the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement apply to private colleges or out-of-state colleges?

No, only the 16 UNC-system colleges are required to honor the CAA. However, many private North Carolina colleges honor the Independent Comprehensive Articulation Agreement (ICAA) which is very similar to the CAA. Out-of-state colleges do not honor either agreement and it is very important to check with the specific college to see how courses will transfer.

17. Are there general education courses that are not covered by the CAA?

Yes, foreign language, physical education, and upper level general education courses are not covered by the CAA. If the college you plan to attend requires any of these you must meet these requirements either at MCC or at the 4-year college.

18. What could make me ineligible for the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement?

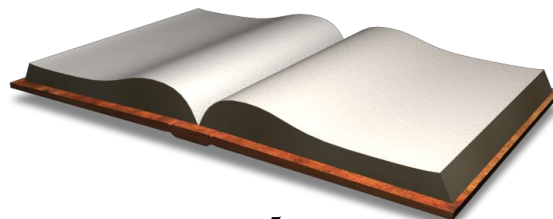
Any of the following conditions will make you ineligible. If any of the following apply to you please contact your transfer advisor and/or the registrar at your college of choice.

- If you entered college prior to Fall 1997 (even if a Dual Enrollment/Huskins Bill student)
- If you are transferring to an out-of-state college
- If you are transferring to a private college
- If you have more than 14 hours of transfer (TR) credits from a school outside the NC Comm. College System or the UNC System. (This transfer credit can only be used in the core.)
- If you have a grade of PR, other than AP scores (including CIS 110)
- If you have a "D" or below in any CAA course
- If you have a GPA below 2.0

19. What do I need to do?

Transfer Checklist

- Visit four year institution websites, and view or request catalogs, applications, and transfer information.
- Visit the four-year institution(s) of your choice; arrange a campus tour and speak to an admissions counselor(s).
- Complete and mail the application form with the application fee before the college's deadline.
- Apply for scholarships prior to the college's designated deadlines. You typically need to complete your application for admissions first.
- Request all transcripts (high school and all colleges attended) and send them to the transfer colleges. You will also need to request a final copy of your transcript, after you have completed all required coursework.
- Complete and send the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- Make an appointment with the department advisor at your chosen transfer college to discuss your major and plan your course of study.
- Participate in your college's orientation program. You may be required to take placement tests at your transfer institution. These are often given during orientation.



Avoiding Transfer Shock

Do not underestimate how different a new college will be. Each college has its own personality and its own way of doing things. You may be emotionally and academically disoriented until you get used to your new environment. The best way to avoid transfer shock is to understand your personal issues related to transfer and to develop a plan to minimize those effects. The following suggestions may help you to cope effectively when you transfer.

- **Visit the Campus:** The **BEST** way to know if you like a college is to visit the campus! Each campus has its own personality and uniqueness and the only way to experience the school is to visit.
- **Get to know the College:** Find out the size, location, the academic majors, and the student life at the colleges you are interested in attending. The more information you have the more comfortable you will feel about your choices.
- **Have two choices:** Apply to at least two colleges - particularly if one of your choices is a private college. You never know what the applicant pool will be like and your GPA will be a factor, so don't assume you will be accepted. Another issue is financial aid. Your first choice college may not be able to offer the financial aid that you need in order to attend. A back-up plan ensures that you won't have to panic at the last minute if you are not accepted to your first choice or the financial aid package you are offered is not sufficient to cover the college's costs.
- **Attend Orientation:** Almost every four-year college has a transfer student orientation program. By attending this program, you will learn about the infrastructure of the college as well as meet key people who will help you adjust to the four-year college culture. You may be required to take placement tests at the transfer institution and these are often given during orientation.
- **Find a Niche:** Knowing your major can give you a place to hang out (the department office) and people to talk with who have similar interests. Involvement with campus activities such as sports, student government and music or theatre can also give you an anchor in the life of the school.
- **Find out what the advising system is:** The advising system is different at every college. Find out who your advisors are and meet with them to discuss your goals and objectives. Scan the college catalog to determine where you can get career or personal counseling.
- **Be prepared for the challenges that lie ahead:** While transferring from MCC to a four-year college allows you to focus on major-related course work, the transition also presents challenges both academically and socially. This is due to upper-division course work that can require more reading, writing, and research. Also, be prepared for the four-year college to be less nurturing in that students are expected to take more initiative in seeking out services, choosing courses, and obtaining financial aid.
- **Get to know your professors!** Introduce yourself and ask them questions. In the four-year college you must be proactive and make the first move to meet your professors. The better your relationship is with them, the more understanding they will be if you need assistance.

Change is usually unsettling and rarely easy. However, it can be managed and the transition of transfer will be minimized if you know what to expect and understand the barriers you will face at the four-year school. If you follow these guidelines, have a positive attitude, and stay focused, you will greatly increase the chances that the transition to the four-year college will be smooth.

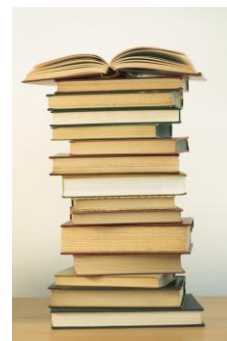
